# Letter from the President Dan Read

AFTER A LOT of back and forth with neighbors, the City Council, City staff, and contractors, it appears the idea of remodeling the old bath house at Duke Park and making it into a community center is not going to come to pass in the near future. The cost of fixing the foundation and floor and renovating bathrooms will—even with significant input from volunteers and donated supplies—probably run about \$200,000 or more.

Even though that amount is approximately what it would cost the City to tear the present building and build a cinder block bathroom hut like the one at Northgate Park, the budget the Council is likely to adopt does not include that money. Several members of the City Council would probably vote for such an appropriation, but it appears that they are not a majority and most of the Council believe that the input they hear from Duke Park is just from the same few people over and over.

Other wheels are squeaking louder, with many more voices. Other neighborhoods get more attention. And unless we as a neighborhood get more active, that is how it will remain. Our bathhouse will continue to moulder and not be attractive, even as a bathroom. The meadow in front of it will keep having a big open hole. Calls for zoning enforcement will continue to go unheeded. Sidewalks will go unbuilt, while other neighborhoods get them.

People call me up at home and ask or tell me, "The Neighborhood Association needs to do this..." and "I need help with that..." I tell them that we are just a small group of volunteers. We do not have an office. We do not have paid staff. We try to take things up, but there is only so much we can do. Remember, the volunteers in the Neighborhood Association are busy people too, with jobs and families of their own. We

need more neighbors to come out to our meetings and volunteer to take on responsibility for the community.

I ask people, "Can you serve as a block captain? All you have to do is get acquainted with the people in your block and be someone the police can call if they need information and to pass on important alerts..." "Oh, I'm just too busy..." "I don't really want to do it..." "I have to think about it..." It gets tough to keep asking.

It's not *all* frustration, of course. Duke Park is still a great place to live. That is especially true when we get a little help, as we did from the City (continued on page 3)

**DESPUÉS DE VARIOS MESES** de platicarlo entre vecinos, el ayuntamiento, empleados municipales, y contractistas, resulta que la idea de remodelar la vieja casita de la alberga en el Parque de Duke como un centro comunitario no va ser posible, por lo menos no en el futuro cercano. El costo para las reparaciones del piso, los cimientos, y los baños — aún y cuando recibamos mucho asistencia de voluntarios y materiales donados — nos costaría por lo menos \$200,000 dólares.

Aunque esa cantidad de dinero es aproximadamente lo que le constaría a la ciudad de Durham para tumbar el edificio y construir baños hecho de bloques de concreto (como los baños en el Parque de Northgate), el presupuesto que la ciudad está preparando ahora probablemente no vaya a incluir fondos para tal proyecto. Varios miembros del consejo municipal estarán dispuestos a votar por tales fondos, pero ellos no son la mayoría, y parece que la mayoría tiene la opinión que los pedidos que recibe de miembros de la comunidad de Duke Park vienen siempre de las mismas cuantas personas una y otra vez.

Hay otros lados de la ciudad donde las necesidades son más graves y las voces pidiendo cambios son más fuertes. Otros vecindarios reciben más atención, y a menos que nosotros empezemos a ponernos más activos en cuanto *(continued on page 5)*

Board Member Angelo Abbate was the DPNA point person to work with the Durham Parks and Recreation Senior Planner Rosetta


Radtke. The plan was set to install the two-rail split rail

This will follow up on recent correspondence and is the formal response of the Neighborhood Association. We deeply regret that anyone has taken it upon themselves to write to you anonymously masquerading as a representative of our organization. We hope that you will continue to be a positive presence in our neighborhood. The Board of the Association entered the following minute at its May 12 meeting:

Item #1: Anonymous Letter "from" DPNA: The Board firstly disavows the recent anonymous letter sent to the Camden Street property owner in the name of DPNA. The Board resolves that it was in no way connected to such letter and regrets that it was sent. The Board further resolves to continue to build a trust relationship with the property owner and encourages reciprocal action on the part of the property owner, including joining DPNA and becoming proactive in the community. Finally, DPNA resolves that it maintains a zero tolerance policy for such action falsely conducted in the name of DPNA and urges all Duke Park neighbors to present any grievances with any property owner to the Board for proper handling. Such action in name of the organization must at a minimum be cleared by the Board, if not the membership; people who violate this will be asked to leave the organization.

**Timing**. Because the ATP contains information about upcoming events, it's critical to the good folk who deliver the good news that you receive your ATP in a timely manner. This way, you can participate in the activities going on within, around and outside of Duke Park. In addition, many of our neighbors do not subscribe to the DPNA listserv because they do not have computers, making the ATP their only source for learning what's going on in Duke Park in particular and the City of Durham in general.

Caring. DPNDs are cognizant of USPS regulation prohibiting the placement of newsletters, like the ATP, in your mailbox. So they are careful to secure your ATP in alternate acceptable places such as, through your mail slot, inside your storm door, rolled up and slid through your door handle or railing. This also prevents your ATP from blowing away and adding to litter on our streets.

**Redistribution.** Sometimes our DPNDs do not have enough ATPs for their routes or, have more than a few copies left over. This may lead you to say, "Hey, I didn't get my ATP" or, "Uh oh, I received duplicates." In either event, our DPNDs report back on the shortfalls and overlaps so that we can make adjustments on the next go round. We want to assure you that no one is intentionally overlooked.

So the next time you find your ATP in your railing, door handle, storm door, or mail slot, forget about magical elves; extend your thanks to your neighbors, who perform the dedicated feat each quarter in the form of DPND extraordinaire!


## **Durham Central Market Update**


#### PART I: NAVIGATION

- 1. Yahoo Email Subscriber. The DPNA ListServ is provided through Yahoo Groups. You need an email address to subscribe to the DPNA ListServ. It does not have to be a Yahoo email account, though many subscribers prefer this method. To create a Yahoo account, go to www.yahoo.com and select the Free Mail Sign Up button. To join the DPNA ListServ using your Yahoo account, visit http://groups.yahoo.com/group/dukepark/ and click the "Join this Group" button. In the Message Delivery section, select whether you wish to receive Individual messages (each message sent immediately) or Digest messages (an email sent daily listing up to 25 messages). The DPNA Listsery is a free, advertisingsupported venture of Yahoo! When you subscribe, you are agreeing to Yahoo's terms of service, which can be found here: http://docs.vahoo.com/info/terms/.
- 2. Non-Yahoo Email Subscriber. To subscribe using a non-Yahoo email address, send a blank email to dukeparksubscribe@yahoogroups.com. Make sure you send your subscribe request from the email address you wish to use to post to the list. If you have a different work and home email address, for example, and you subscribe using your home address, even if you have your home emails forwarded to your work address, you will not be able to post to the list from the work address.
- **DPNA Yahoo Group Logon**. Whether you subscribe with a Yahoo Account or other email account, you can go directly to the DPNA Yahoo Group website with this link: https://login.yahoo.com/config/login\_verify2?.intl=us&.sr c=ygrp&.done=http%3a//groups.yahoo.com%2Fgroup%2 Fdukepark%2F. Here you can browse the DPNA ListServ archives for posts (and attachments) you may have missed, view photos, files, and search the database containing service providers recommended by your neighbors. Be aware, though, that you may miss out on some timely offers of first-come, first-serve furniture, tickets, etc. Also, the occasional attachment is not stored in the archives

- 4. DPNA ListServ Logon. Log on to the DPNA ListServ by entering this link into your browser: https://login.yahoo.com/config/login\_verify2?&.src =ym. This is where you receive messages sent to every subscriber, and send messages from your subscribed email account.
- 5. Reply. When you click the 'Reply' button, your post will be sent **BY DEFAULT** dukepark@yahoo.com and, ultimately, listsery subscribers. Please remember that before you hit the 'Send' button.
- Reply to All. Click the arrow to the right of the Reply button, to choose "Reply to All," All, being the sender, PLUS any addressees listed in the carbon copy ('Cc:') or blind carbon copy ('Bcc:') fields.
- 7. **Reply Offlist**. To reply to the sender offlist: 1) click the 'Reply' button, 2) delete the default address from within the 'To:' field, 3) copy and paste the email address of the message sender into the 'To:' field, and 4) begin composing your reply.



You can also forward and delete messages, as well as filter junkmail into the 'Spam' folder. Navigating your email messages is just about as simple as that!

## A Welcome Refuge

Duke Park is a haven for birds, and maintaining a feeder will bring many colorful visitors to your yard. Every morning we awaken to a bird song and start the day by checking out the avian residents through the front window. We keep binoculars and field guides (Sibley and Petersons) on the table in case a rare bird flits in for a snack. Those which frequent our yard are the Cardinal, Chickadee, Mourning Dove, House/Purple Finch, Goldfinch, Bronze and Boat-tailed Grackle, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, White-breasted Nuthatch, Robin, White-throated Sparrow, Brown Thrasher, Tufted Titmouse, Towhee, Downy and Red-bellied Woodpecker, and Carolina Wren.

Bluebirds come for a while in the spring, but have yet to nest in our bluebird boxes. We have had visits from the Indigo Bunting, Rosebreasted Grosbeak, Northern Parula Warbler, and one Scarlet Tanager.

Hawks and owls are also common in Duke Park. Avian expert Josh Rose identified the hawk in Ruta Slepetis's photo as a juvenile Red Shouldered Hawk. Red Tail and Cooper's Hawks are also common, as is the Barred Owl. Its expressive call, "whoo whoo, whoo, whoo," is a pleasure to hear in the evening calm.

No matter the time of day or season, we are grateful for the host of colorful, majestic, feathered friends that perch and feed and nest in Duke Park, a welcome refuge. •
